- **Border Disputes:** Long-standing territorial conflicts, including the Line of Actual Control (LAC), have often resulted in military standoffs, such as the 2020 Galwan Valley clash. The unresolved border issues continue to strain bilateral relations, leading to periodic escalations and military build-ups in the Himalayan region.
- **Economic Ties:** Despite political and security tensions, China remains one of India's largest trading partners. Bilateral trade between the two nations is substantial, with China being a major supplier of electronics, machinery, and raw materials to India. However, India's recent economic policies, including the Atmanirbhar Bharat initiative and restrictions on Chinese investments in critical sectors, aim to reduce dependency on Chinese goods and boost domestic manufacturing.
- **Geopolitical Rivalry and Regional Influence:** Both India and China are vying for influence in South Asia, the Indian Ocean, and beyond. China's Belt and Road Initiative (BRI) has expanded its presence in India's neighboring countries, raising concerns in New Delhi. In response, India has strengthened its strategic partnerships with ASEAN nations, Japan, and the United States to counterbalance China's growing regional footprint.
- **Indo-Pacific Strategy:** India's active participation in the Quadrilateral Security Dialogue (Quad), alongside the US, Japan, and Australia, is seen as a key effort to counter China's influence in the Indo-Pacific region. The Quad promotes a rules-based international order, freedom of navigation, and security cooperation, which align with India's broader strategic objectives.
- **Multilateral Cooperation:** Despite strategic differences, India and China collaborate in global forums such as BRICS, the Shanghai Cooperation Organization (SCO), and the G20. Both countries share common interests in global trade, climate change, and reforming international financial institutions, demonstrating areas where cooperation remains possible.
- **Regional Security and Strategic Concerns:** India views Pakistan's close ties with China, including the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC), as a strategic challenge. Additionally, Pakistan's role in Afghanistan and its relationships with extremist groups raise security concerns for India, leading to ongoing vigilance and diplomatic maneuvering.

3.2. India-Pakistan Relations: Enduring Rivalry: India and Pakistan have a historically tense relationship marked by territorial disputes, military conflicts, and diplomatic challenges. The rivalry between the two nuclear-armed nations remains one of the most significant geopolitical tensions in South Asia.

Attacks such as the 2001 Indian Parliament attack, the 2008 Mumbai attacks, and the 2019 Pulwama attack have led to significant diplomatic strains. India has responded with measures such as surgical strikes and air raids on terrorist camps, further intensifying tensions.
- **Trade and Connectivity:** Economic ties between India and Pakistan remain minimal due to political hostilities. While trade has occurred through limited channels, diplomatic disputes and security concerns have often led to restrictions. Recent efforts to enhance connectivity, such as opening the Kartarpur Corridor for Sikh pilgrims, indicate some areas of cooperation, but large-scale economic collaboration remains hindered by political mistrust.

The two countries are also collaborating on special economic zones and connectivity projects to enhance trade and investment.
- **Connectivity and Infrastructure Development:** India and Bangladesh are working on multiple connectivity projects, including rail and road links, inland waterways, and energy corridors. The Maitree Express and Bandhan Express have strengthened railway connectivity, while initiatives like the India-Bangladesh Coastal Shipping Agreement facilitate smoother trade operations.
- **Security and Border Management:** India and Bangladesh cooperate closely on counterterrorism efforts, cross-border crime, and regional security. Both nations have taken steps to curb illegal migration, smuggling, and insurgency activities along their shared border.
- **Water Sharing and Environmental Cooperation:** The sharing of transboundary rivers, particularly the Tista River, remains a crucial issue in bilateral relations. Both countries are engaged in discussions to ensure fair water distribution and sustainable river management.

India has invested in key projects such as the Kaladan Multi-Modal Transport Project and the India-Myanmar-Thailand Trilateral Highway, both of which enhance regional connectivity.
- **Security and Border Management:** Myanmar's internal conflicts and insurgencies have cross-border implications for India, particularly in the northeastern states. India collaborates with Myanmar on counterinsurgency operations, intelligence sharing, and border security to prevent the movement of insurgent groups and arms trafficking.
